Everyday Shielding

- Broilers & Layers: Mix 0.5–1 kg of KINVET MycoGuard into 1 ton of feed every day.
- Breeders: Use 1–3 kg per 1 ton, based on your nutritionist’s advice.

When Feed Looks Suspicious

- Noticing uneven growth, odd droppings, or unexplained illness?
 - Bump up to 1 kg (broilers/layers) or 3 kg (breeders) per ton for 5–7 days.
 - Once birds recover, drop back to your regular dose.

Farmhand Favorites: Do’s

1. Seal Out Moisture

- Keep KINVET MycoGuard in its **original bag**, stored in a **cool, dry spot**.
- Dampness cuts its binding power—always re-seal tightly.

2. Blend for Coverage

- Sprinkle in **slowly** while mixing feed to coat every grain.
- A uniform “earthy” scent means you’ve nailed the mix.

3. Observe Your Flock

- Check feed intake, weight gain, and droppings **daily**.
- Early signs of trouble = time to boost your dose.

4. Maintain Dry Litter

- Wet floors encourage mold—scoop out damp spots and rake fresh bedding.
- Good air flow keeps both toxins and disease at bay.

5. Safe for Every Bird

- Works for **broilers, layers, breeders, and backyard flocks**.
 - No withdrawal period—eggs and meat stay market-ready.
